THE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT – General Information

The Education Department is a vibrant, dynamic, multi-faceted group within St. Angela's College and has a proud tradition of providing a range of high quality and innovative programmes in the areas of teacher education and education and training. Graduates of the undergraduate and postgraduate programmes bear testament to the high standard of professionalism aspired to by the Department and are employed in a wide variety of settings and locations. In keeping with the College's mission, the Department's committed, innovative and progressive staff initiate, develop and modify programmes to respond proactively and positively to existing and emerging needs of the educational community within the region and nationally.

The Education Department is a supportive and cohesive team which seeks to identify and meet the needs of the community it serves and develops a broad range of programmes to meet such needs through collaboration and partnerships both internally and externally. Within the College, the Education Department liaises and co-operates with the other College Departments and programmes in providing and developing a range of courses and research initiatives. Members of the Education Department form part of the membership of the B. Ed. Course Board and the Interdepartmental Postgraduate/Masters Course Board. Also the Department consults with all parties involved in the School Placement programme through a series of Tutors' meetings and debriefing seminars with students. The Department is also involved in a number of collaborative partnerships with other third level institutions with respect to research, programme provision and project development at Regional, National and International levels.

The Education Department established the Centre for Special Educational Needs, Inclusion and Diversity (CSENID) in 2011 to enhance professional knowledge and develop career opportunities for all the educational partners (pupils, teachers, parents, principals, other school personnel, and other professionals) in the BMW region and beyond. The work of CSENID includes curriculum planning, programme delivery, research and resource development. A range of pre-undergraduate, undergraduate and postgraduate programmes as well as shorter professional development courses and standalone on-line blended learning modules are offered by the Centre. The Programmes developed through CSENID are designed to provide a student-centred, flexible, accessible, coherent framework for personal, professional and academic development of participants. Accredited stand-alone blended learning modules in literacy, numeracy and inclusion have been developed by CSENID. CSENID in collaboration with the Special Education Support Service (SESS) and the Teacher Education Section of the

DES provide the only national post-graduate diploma programme for teachers who support pupils with autism in Ireland in all sectors, ranging from early childhood to post primary.

The Education Department offers courses at certificate, diploma, undergraduate and postgraduate levels. It has responsibility for Education programmes including the Education components of the Initial Teacher Education, Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.) (Home Economics) programme for post-primary teachers, Education Studies programme, Special Educational Needs programmes (provided through the CSENID), Religious Education and Theology programmes, Gaeilge programmes, Management in Education, Training and Facilitation programmes.

The Bachelor of Education (Home Economics) Concurrent Degree (Level 8) programme consists of three main components: Home Economics, Education and one of the following disciplines: Science/Biology, Religious Education, Gaeilge or Economics. This undergraduate B.Ed. degree, which is accredited by the National University of Ireland, Galway and recognised by the Teaching Council, is a four year professional and academic qualification and is designed to provide participants with the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary for teaching Home Economics and either Biology, Religious Education, Gaeilge or Economics in the post-primary sector and in the Special, Community or Post-compulsory sectors. The Education Department has responsibility for the Education, Religious Education and Gaeilge components of the programme together with specific teaching methodologies in these areas and also in the areas of Biology/Science and Economics.

The education components of the degree programme incorporate the Foundation Disciplines of Initial Teacher Education(ITE) of History and Policy of Education, Psychology, Philosophy and Sociology of Education including Special Educational Needs and Development Education and the Professional Preparation and Development aspects including Curriculum Studies, General and Specific Teaching Methodologies, Educational Research, Information and Communication Technologies, Micro-teaching and Teaching Practice.

In general, the programme aims to provide a cohesive, cumulative Initial Teacher Education programme and endeavours to foster in students an ability to engage in professionally relevant critical thinking and reflective practice. The concurrent nature of the four-year programme facilitates a gradual build-up of attitudes, values, knowledge, understanding, competencies, personal and professional confidence and self-awareness. Throughout the programme theory is related to practice, connecting content knowledge with teaching methods, and teaching strategies with student learning and development. It facilitates the provision of an experiential gradient and continuum of teaching activity, leading from lectures/workshops including Foundation Disciplines in ITE, General and Specific Teaching Methodologies in Home Economics, Religious Education, Science/Biology, Gaeilge, Economics and , Communication Studies and ICT and Audio Visual Programme to a practicum consisting of microteaching and School Placement accompanied by an emphasis on self-evaluation and reflection. School Placement is an essential element in all four years of the B. Ed. programme and students are given an opportunity to develop their professional competencies through participation in the Microteaching programme and through teaching in a variety of school and educational settings within the context of a structured, developmental and supportive programme framework.

At undergraduate level the Education Department also provides a Bachelor of Arts / Diploma / Certificate in Theology and Community Involvement (Level 8) in partnership with Newman Institute, Ballina caters for those who seek to know more about the spiritual and religious side of life as interpreted in the Christian tradition and those who want to deepen their knowledge of the main tenets of Christian faith. It is provided for people already involved in or taking up positions of responsibility or ministry in local faith communities or parishes or those involved in or who hope to be involved in the area of religious education or school or hospital Chaplaincy.

In addition, the Education Department provides a range of postgraduate programmes incorporating both professional qualifications and professional development in the areas of Education, Education Management and Education and Training for teachers and others working in the areas of education and training. In the Education Department, there are currently fifteen permanent academic posts including the Head of Department, one secondment academic post, three administrators, one AV Technician and an Access Programme Co-ordinator and Schools' Co-ordinator. In addition, there are a number of academic staff who work inter-departmentally and a number of part-time academic members of staff, many of whom make a substantial contribution to programme development and delivery.
